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January Tour





Day tour Tuesday 26th January PB Valley Khao Yai Winery

In 1989 the first vineyard of Thailand was planted, spread over a total of 20 hectares. With the harvest of 1998, PB Valley Khao Yai Winery celebrated its first milestone. It is still the largest vineyard in Khao Yai nowadays.

PB Valley Estate is located 150 km's northeast of Bangkok on the edge of the Khao Yai National Park (2-2.5 h. drive). On our tour we will visit the wine estate and if we are lucky, harvesting started by then (depending on weather, usually starting end of January)

We will do the **Vineyard and Winery Tour**, a guided tour of the vineyards with explanation about the various wine grapes as well fresh table grapes. The tour also includes other fruit orchards such as dragon fruit, passion fruit and others as this is a point of interest to many visitors. This is followed by a tour of the Winery which includes a wine tasting at the wine tasting and education center next to the winery. The tour will start at 10:30 am and takes about 75 minutes. Afterwards you will have the opportunity to shop wines and other produce like juices, jams sauces and other produce of PB Valley at the Wine and Souvenir Shop next to the Great Hornbill Grill ©

At noon a great lunch will be served. We can choose from a Thai or Western menu (details when signed up)



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
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
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Recipes please

Where D'You Go, Bernadette? By Marie Semple

I must admit I was not keen to read this book mostly because of the cover and the implied chick flick content and the blurbs implication of yet another book about mothers. How wrong could I be? Yes, the story is a bit chick flicky but it is an easy and entertaining read. The writing style is through a series of emails and transcripts of conversations. This might sound odd but we all think it worked very well.

The book is about a married couple (Bernadette and Elgie) and their 15-year-old daughter (Bee). Bernadette started a very successful career as an architect, rapidly rose to fame and then gave it all up after having a child, Bee. Elgie then realized his career in Microsoft as a top nerd programmer and designer. Bee, ultra clever, gets a scholarship for a "top" school. The book focuses upon a short period in their lives when the Desperate Housewife syndrome (does this exist?) kicks in. There's competition and conflict between the "good" school mums and Bernadette who really doesn't fit in and doesn't even want to try. This escalates out of control and Bernadette disappears. Bee tasks herself with finding out what happened.

In no way is this book a whodunnit there is a mystery but this is secondary to the book, it's more about how events get misinterpreted and things get out of hand. Well worth pursuing.

Unusually, most of us read the book – partly I guess 'cos we had a free copy and it was short and sweet. One thought it was OK but all the others enjoyed it. 
