

Escape for a day!

It's eight o' clock on a weekday morning in True Coffee. All around can be heard the excited chatter of women, happy to see dear friends again after a month of absence, sharing holiday adventures, December family disasters, relief to have children back at school again or just catching up on the latest news. All of us are happy to be able to escape our normal routines and to undertake a small adventure.

Later, still chatting animatedly the 17 ladies are herded onto mini buses by the two guides from Spice Roads. Instantly preparations begin to get ready for the long bike ride to Koh Kret. Sunscreen is slathered on liberally, mosquito spray is applied. In my bus one girl puts on lip gloss, just in case there's an accident and a sexy ambulance worker needs to be charmed. One can never be over-prepared.

Finally we reach the drop-off point where we are to be kitted out with bikes, helmets and water. Some are delighted with their bikes, others are in despair. Some bikes are way too small for normal sized Farang women and one or two of our fellow bikers look like frogs having to cycle with their knees past their ears. Still others are unlucky enough to be given bikes with hard seats adapted for the male anatomy and very unfriendly to the tender female anatomy. After a few painful hours, this seat is finally swopped with the guides' very well padded, soft seat.

Finally we are on our way along the fairly quiet rural roads. We pass all sorts of crops and I see an actual rice plant close up for the first time. Our guide is most friendly but interprets guiding duties in the most liberal sense possible. He points out only one sort of crop (said rice plant) along the way, gets lost twice and brings us to the lunch venue too early. It turns out to still be closed, which is just as well as we stuffed our faces on delicious, cool and juicy fruit just half an hour earlier. Feeling very virtuous about having such a healthy snack, we immediately supplemented the calories we just rode off by scoffing chocolates, crisps and coke. No need to shock the body with too much healthy stuff, for goodness sake!

After crossing the river on ferries we finally arrive on Koh Kret, the small man-made island that is the home of the Mon community and known for its beautiful pottery. There are no cars allowed on the island and the ride on the raised concrete paths is lovely and peaceful. We pass well kept little houses, many with their own potted gardens and friendly industrious people going about their daily business. Our biking skills are tested to the limit on the narrow, winding roads, with sharp bends everywhere. There are one or two crashes, but nothing too serious and fortunately no need to call ambulances, sexy drivers or not!

There are two stops on the island, one at a pottery manufacturing site, where, sadly, the traditional brick kiln has been sidelined in favour of a very unattractive modern kiln. We have the opportunity to admire the beautiful, intricately made pottery pieces before moving on to our next stop, a local Wat. Here we sample some fried spiced morning glory and coconut - absolutely delicious and much better than crisps. On our way back we stop for a group photo at the best known symbol of Koh Kret, the leaning, chedi that can easily be spotted from a boat on the river.

Crossing back over the river, we try the lunch venue again and are pleasantly surprised by a table crammed with delectable Thai fare. All our usual favourites are included: spicy Tom Yum Kung, pork curry, chicken with cashew nuts, vegetables in oyster sauce, fried pork and rice, washed down with bottles of coke and water - to die for after such exertion!

Sadly, the end of lunch signals the end of the day. Now all that is left is to agree on how far we cycled so we can brag to our husbands and boyfriends about how hard we worked today and about how many thousands of calories we must have burned. Questioning the guide results in estimates ranging anywhere from fifteen kilometres to thirty five kilometres. We all agree that it must have been thirty five kilometres if not further, and as proof of this, we point to our sore bums and stiff muscles. But, truth be told, between you and me, I think it was closer to fifteen. Nevertheless, another interesting day in Bangkok drew to a close as we all returned to the real world, picking up children and getting on with the normal routine...

International Schools celebrate Bangkok: World Book Capital 2013

To celebrate Bangkok being the UNESCO World Book Capital 2013, some of the leading international schools in and around the capital are joining together to run the Bangkok Book Awards with the winning book announced on 29th March 2013.

Josie Crimp, Head of Libraries, at Shrewsbury International School has spearheaded the project, supported by the other participating schools including Bangkok Patana School, The City School, Concordian International School, Garden International School (Rayong), International School Eastern Seaboard (ISE), KIS International School, New International School of Thailand (NIST) and Regent's School Pattaya.

The participating schools are voting for the best children's and teen fiction set in Thailand. There are three shortlists; the **Picture Book Award** for younger children, the **Junior Book Award** for older children and the **Teen Book Award** for teens and adults. The shortlist was compiled by librarians and teachers from the participating schools. It aims to show a breadth of culture and ranges from the traditional to the modern.

Matt Mills, Head of Bangkok Patana School, explains more. "This is a superb opportunity to celebrate reading and to enjoy books written by Thai authors and books set in and about Thailand. We are delighted to be part of this project. It has been advertised widely to our community and we are hoping that our students, staff and parents will take the opportunity to borrow books from our libraries and vote in the competition. It is a privilege to be able to learn so much about our host country."

It is a great honour for Bangkok to be chosen as UNESCO World Book Capital 2013 and this is one small gesture by the participating schools to recognise the city's status and to promote reading. Prominent authors such as Botan, R. P Harris, Carolyn Marsden and Colin Cotterill have been delighted to have been chosen for the shortlist and are supporting the competition by providing interviews, answering questions and sharing publication material. Children in all the schools have been encouraged to borrow and read the books and those in the Senior Section are becoming popular book club choices.

Karen Wright, Head of Human Resources at Bangkok Patana School stated, "My book club has chosen to read 'Letters from Thailand' by Botan. I am learning so much about Thai, Chinese and even Western culture through reading the book and anticipate some lively discussion at our next meeting!"

Should you find yourself in need of something to read over the coming weeks why not choose one of the titles on the Bangkok Book Awards shortlist? If you are a member of one of the participating school's communities don't forget to vote for your favourite book. 



They were presented with their backpacks by the Year 3 student council.

After this, they were allowed to play in the adventure playground, each child with a student from Patana. They instinctively found their way and easily integrated with the other children effortlessly. No language or cultural differences were apparent as they climbed, jumped and hung on the monkey bars. A little snack was waiting for them. But there was a little extra play area with some toys. They rushed with their milk and cakes to be able to play some more before leaving.

After checking out the fish in the pond and the Christmas trees, taking a lot of pictures in every corner. The children were chauffeured back to their school. There were a lot of happy faces appearing from the car window screaming and waving as they drove off!!

Sometimes you look into these children eyes and wonder what could be going on in their minds. Maybe they are just enjoying the moment with
