.... This sanctuary is a monumental project undertaken by the late eccentric billionaire Khun Lek who was also responsible for the creation of the Ancient City and the Three-Headed Elephant Art Museum.

.... It is a gigantic temple (the biggest in Thailand) made entirely of wood, with an indoor size of 2115 sq m, height 105m and length 100m. It stands in defiance of the harsh ocean elements on the seashore at Rachvate Cape. It has already taken more than 25 years to build and is yet to be completed. When this happens, it might even be the 8^{th} wonder of the world due to its wooden structures and intricate details.

.... The wood carvings and wooden sculptures depict the 4 major artistic and philosophical influences that can be seen in Thailand, namely, Hindu, Khmer, Chinese and Thai influences. Its aim is to make visitors understand Ancient Life, Human Responsibility, Basic Thought, Cycle of Life, Life Relationship with the Universe and the Common Goal of Life toward Utopia.

.... There is a team of 250 wood carvers hard at work on the sanctuary and you might even see them in action.

.... On top of all the above, there is also a ½ hour dolphin show which you can watch.

"Well," said the woman, "I'm not going to give you the money. "Instead, I'm going to take you out for dinner with my hubby and myself tonight."


The homeless Woman was astounded.


We all ate to our fill and enjoyed talking and finding out what each other were planning for Christmas. Then we got down to the important part of the day. PRESENTS.

SILC MAHJONG NEWS

SILC Mahjong ladies meet on Wednesdays at members' homes to enjoy a session of social and fun games. On Wednesday 22nd November however, a group of 16 ladies turned up for a coffee morning at Shirley's house and learned a little bit about the game.



We started off by learning about the history of this ancient game. Shirley then took us through briefly on the rules of play and everyone had the opportunity to learn to identify all the different tiles available in a Mahjong set. Without much delayed, Shirley put everyone in buddy system with the experienced players helping the beginners. More rules were briefed at the table in order for the beginners to better understand how the game is played. Some found it challenging and interesting but other found it confusing. Simply because mahjong, unlike other card games, goes counter clockwise. And the long list of rules that one has to remember can be quite frustrating for first timers. Nevertheless, everyone did very well!

Everyone had so much fun 'punging' and 'kunging' away! All tried their best to outplay one another and go 'Mahjong' as fast as they could. Cheers and laughter came from all around and it lasted all morning (Good thing the house next door was empty).

Well, time flies when you are having fun! After just 3 rounds, it was time to call it a day. By then most had learned the basic game and were able to play with minimum guidance. Mahjong can be enjoyed by all especially those who enjoyed mental challenging games. It is a very good way to keep ones brain active.

The History of Mahjong

Mahjong is said to have originated in the court of the King of Wu. This was roughly the time that Confucius exited, which was some five hundred years before the Christian era. Within this court, there lived a beauty in seclusion. To keep herself from utter boredom, she invented a game of her own. She began to carve dominoshaped pieces of ivory and bamboo. When she was finished, she invited three of her maids to play her newly invented game. Each person was to receive 34 tiles in which they would each create a wall with. The exact rules that were applied are unknown but the lowest score is said to have been 22 points and the highest 389,928 points.

For centuries, mahjong remained exclusive of the royal class. It was against the law for commoners to play. The penalty for commoners who dares to play mahjong was decapitation. However, around 500 A.D, the penalty was lifted, which enable everyone who desired to play mahjong to do so.

Lifting the ban on the commoner's right to play mahjong enabled the game to spread to various countries around the world. By 1923, mahjong's popularity was growing at a tremendous rapid rate. Mahjong sets were being shipped into the U.S. by the thousands and stood sixth in value in the list of exports from Shanghai. Mahjong sets were only surpassed by exports of silks, laces, skins, eggs and tea. By late 1920, the popularity of mahjong seemed to taper off. Its popularity faded away almost as quickly as it came, leaving importers with million dollars worth of unwanted mahjong sets. For many, mahjong was just another fad in America's long list of leisure fads. However, for a group of enthusiast, this game became a permanent part of their lives, for they continued to play the game in hopes of rejuvenating the craze.

The depression of the 1930's sparked the revival of many table games, card games and board games. Among them was no other than mahjong. Experts speculated that the resurgence of certain games came about because many were bored with movies, concerts and radio. People desired the mental agility that games of the past has to offer. If a mental challenge was what people wanted, mahjong was definitely the game, for it was often called "Game of Hundred Intelligences" simply because it required much concentration. Although the game never reached its initial popularity, mahjong was revived after 1935. Once again, the game was among the many leisure activities that people around the world engaged in. To this very day, mahjong is still being played and enjoyed by all.

Introduction

Mahjong is a traditional Chinese tiles game with many variations. In Chinatowns throughout the country, mahjong is played regularly and often associated with gambling and serious competition. For those who simply love games, mahjong can be played with the same enthusiasm and competitive spirit for "bones" or "chips" signifying points. It is with the "friendly play" view point that these notes are offered.

The literal translation of "Mahjong" is "flax/hemp", "sparrow clattering". Those who play the game love the sound of the tiles as they mixed together prior to the start of each hand. Listening carefully, players hear the sound of the flax blowing in the wind and the sparrow clattering.

Tiles

A complete set contains 144 tiles. The tiles fall into four categories: suits, honor tile, flowers and seasons. There are three suits: the circles, the bamboos and the characters. The suits tiles are numbers 1 through 9, and in any given suits, there are four of each number. Suit tiles may be normal or terminal (honor) tiles, 1s and 9s, are more valuable in winning, than normal, 2s through 8s. In the character suit, instead of the corresponding number of symbols on the tile, the Chinese numeral character appears above the character signifying 10,000.

There are two types of honor tiles: the winds (East, South, West and North) and the dragons (Red, Green and White). Just as there are four of each suit number, there are also four of each wind and four of each dragon.

The flower and season tiles differ in nature from the suit and honor tiles. There are four flower tiles (Plum, Lily, Chrysanthemum and Bamboo) and four season tiles (Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter). When drawn, they are declared and a substitute tile is drawn.

The Game

Mahjong is played by four people. Three can play a modified version with certain restrictions but the ideal number of players is four, seated at a card table. Who will deal first is determined by player rolling the dice. The highest roller will deal, and assume "East". The other direction follows according to seating. To the right of East is South; to the right of South is West (across from east), and to the right of West is North (to the left of East). The order of play, beginning with East, therefore is counter clockwise. Note: If East wins the game, that person remains East (dealer) until they lose.

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





.KOPITIAM


